Gun maker John (Bill Willis, CompuServe Roots Forum Gilbert pgs 24-29, its probably not accurate to describe any of the Walkers as "Irish". In truth, they were Scotch Irish; their acquaintance with Ireland consisted of no more than a 20 year residence in the Ulster plantation before the family removed to the New World. The family came to Ireland from Wigton Scotland between 1705 and 1726 and left from Newry, Ireland 1726/28. John II settled near Newry Ireland, migrated to New World 1726/1728, settled on the Ocotaro Watershed, in PA. John and Katharine are buried in the cemetery of the Nottingham Meeting house. "The John Walkers landed at a Maryland port on the Chesapeake Bay. From there they immediately traveled north to Chester County in Pennsylvania, which was a staging area and something of a displaced persons camp for their compatriots. This was the second substantial migratory move the couple had made. Both were natives of Wigton, a community in the southwestern lowlands of Scotland, which by the time the Walkers reached adulthood was so depressed that people were its chief export. John and Katherine left in 1700 or thereabouts to relocate in Ulster, across the Irish Sea. There they remained until they had enough resources or had become convinced that they must go to America. Few personal records of the couple survive, but since they were lowland Presbyterian Scots living in Ulster, it is almost certain that they had little hope of improving their situation in the north of Ireland." They came with eight children, 3 daughters, 5 sons, 2 nephews and 1 son-in-law, John Campbell, Duke of Argyll who married the eldest daughter, Elizabeth. John Walker (2), born in Wigton, Scotland, married Katherine Rutherford January 07, 1702, in Scotland. From Scotland he moved his family and settled near the town of Newry, Ireland. He and family with three of his brother Alexander's children left Strangford bay in May 1726 (another record says 28 or 30 on board a vessel commanded by Richard Walker, and landed in Maryland August 02. He transported his family and settled in Chester Co., Pa., where he died in September, 1734; his wife died in 1738; both buried at Nottingham Meeting House in Chester Co., Pa. Most of the family left Pa. and settled in Rockbridge and adjoining counties in Virginia. John Walker contemplated such a move, and had been to Virginia a short time previous to his death and selected a farm upon which he erected a small building. Katherine Rutherford was a daughter of John Rutherford and Isabella Allein. Their eleven children were; Elizabeth Walker born april 1703 married John Campbell in Ireland John Walker born 1705 married Ann Houston in 1734 James Walker born 1707 married Mary Guffy in 1737 Thomas Walker (died young) William Walker (died young) Jane Walker born 1712 married James Moore 1734 Samuel Walker married Jane Patterson (3) Alexander Walker b.1716 & d. 1784/5 married Jane Hammer in 1747 Esther Walker (died young) Joseph Walker married 1st. Nancy McClung; 2nd Grizelda McCosky Mary Walker (no account of her)1

Another version of about John Walker II is:

John Walker and his wife Katherine RUTHERFORD, first lived in Wigtownshire, Scotland, where John Walker Jnr. was b.1705, later moving to Newry (?), co. Antrim, Ireland. They sailed from Strangford Bay, Ireland in May 1726, landing in Maryland in August 1726. They settled in Chester Co., PA where he died in 1734. Katherine WALKER (nee Rutherford) also died 1734. Most of the family of John Walker moved from Pennsylvania and settled in Augusta and Rockbridge Counties, Virginia.

The Rutherford family may have lived near the Walker and Houston families in / near Whithorn, Wigtownshire in the 1600s. The Houston family may have

intermarried with the Adair families of Wigtownshire and Ireland and the Agnew families of Wigtownshire and Ireland.

John Walker, Jr., born 1705, married 1734 Ann HOUSTON. He first settled in Augusta Co. VA, and later with the Hays family moved to Rockbridge Co. and settled at Walker's Creek. Another source said John Walker, Jr. settled on Clinch River in what is today Russell Co. The Houston family may have originally been from Whithorn, Wigtownshire Scotland before moving to Northern Ireland possibly in the 1600s.

Ann Walker, daughter of John and Ann HOUSTON Walker married Samuel COWA and they settled 3 April 1774 lower Castlewood, now called Cowan's Cree Fincastle Co., VA.

Rockbridge County, VA Will Book 2, pp. 36-38. (Abstract) Will of Robert Stoops of Rockbridge County, VA. Made 26 Sep 1797. To be buried in a Christian manner. Recommends soul to God. "unto my beloved wife Rachel Stoops and her children by me that is Thomas, Betsy, Nancy & James Stoops and the child my wife is now with", the plantation with the benefits from it until the youngest child by her reaches full age, then to be sold and 1/3 given unto "my wife" during her natural life, the rest to be divided equally among 'my children by her and at her decease her part to be given to my children by her at her descretion." To "my wife Rachel Stoops and her children by me the house and furniture clothing, beds in every respect with the whole of grain and what grain in the ground with milch cows & the House to be for the use of her and children." To "My sons David and John Stoops the sum of five pounds each to be collected out of the price of my stock & farming utensils" To "My son Robt Stoops I give the sum of five pounds with all my shoemaking tools the horse saddle and bridle and one steer that he calls his" "I further will that all my stock after the above divide and farming utensils to be sold disburs any debts that is or may arise from the necessary expenses of my funeral or otherways and after this above deductions the over plus to be for the use of my wife & children by her as also my Book accounts to be justly Ballanced and what may remain due to me to be for the use of my wife & children by her as above-" " I ordain constitute and appoint my trust and beloved friends John Walker Junior and john Walker Senior to be the sole Executors of this my last will and testament." Renounces and disannuls all former wills. Signed: Robert Stoops Senr In Presence of: Robert Everitt James Hays Robert Weir Rockbridge Court- 3 Oct 1797 Produced by John Walker Senr & John Walker Junr, Executors. Proved by oaths of Robert Everitt, James hays and Robert Weir. Ordered to be recorded. Exors refused to undertake the burden. On the motion of Rachel Stoops, widow of said decedent and John McCown who make certificate according to law, certificate is granted them for obtaining letters of administration. ***** Rockbridge County VA Will Book 2, pp. 40-42. Henry Miller's Will, made 31 August 1797, proven 3 October 1797. In the name of God Amen. I Henry Miller of Rockbridge County, and State of Virginia, being in a declining state of health but of sound mind and memory and also considering the mortal state of man in this life do think it necessary to settle my temporal concerns in the manner following viz: First I desire that my body may be decently buried at the discretion of my executors hereinafter named and further that all just claims against my estate may be settled (sic) and paid out of my estate and first of all I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Rebecca Miller and to my daughter Rebecca Miller jointly all

and singular my household furniture of whatever kind soever (sic) without reserve to be theirs and at their disposal after my decease and I do further give and bequeath to my said wife one bond for the sum of twenty pounds due me from my son John Miller also fifteen dollars due me by William Gilmore also my young black mare and her saddle and bridle also two of her choice of my stock of cattle also I do further order and direct that my said wife shall have and continue to have full possession of my house and plantation after my decease during her life, unmolested but reserving at the same time to my son Samuel Miller the privilege (sic) of enjoying the possession of the place where he now lives and of working all my cleared land and clearing more as he may choose together with the profits of the meadows and orchard to to (sic) witt (sic): the two-thirds also the labour (sic) of my negro boy George when my said wife can spare him and for said privileges (sic) granted to my son Samuel he is to deliver to my said wife the one third of all the crops he raises thereon to haul and put up conveniently (sic) and securely for her the same and also the remaining third of the meadow and orchards together with firewood hauled conveniently (sic) for her also such piece of ground as she may choose for a garden and provided the sd. Saml. is indolent so that the share reserved for my said wife may not be sufficient for her support at his expense. I also give and bequeath to my said daughter Rebecca my young mare horse and her saddle and bridle with the next two of my cattle that she may choose and I further order and that the remainder of my movable property be sold at publick vendue excepting so much of my cattle and hogs as will be winter meat for my family and of grain untill (sic) the new crop comes and all of my share of the crop that is in the ground I leave to support my family and the crops to be put in this fall I leave for the use of my family and I also devise and bequeath to my said son Samuel Miller the plantation whereon I now live to him and his heirs forever provided he complies with the requisitions herein before and hereafter mentioned and first he is to pay to each of his four sisters the sum of fifty pounds each in the manner following that is to say the sum of twelve pounds and ten shillings annually the first payment thereof to be made one year after my decease and to be paid annually till (sic) each of them receives the aforesaid fifty pounds and also I leave my said wife in addition to what is herein before mentioned in the hands of my said son John, and William Gilmore as much of the money arising from the sale of the movable property that I have desired to be sold as will be sufficient to purchase her a good young negro wench. I also give and bequeath to my son William Miller after my wife's decease my negroe fellow George, also my brown coat and waistcoat and one half of the neet proceeds arising from the sale of my movable property desired to be sold as aforesaid if after answering the purposes aforesd. any may remain and the other half to my said son Samuel and I also leave and bequeath to my nephew William McGlothlen my black coat waistcoat and breeches. And lastly I do constitute and appoint my two sons Saml. and William Miller my sole executors of this my last will and testament for the purposes herein before mentioned and I do hereby revoke and disannul all and every other testament and executors ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have here unto sett (sic) my hand and seal this thirty first day of august (sic) one thousand seven hundred and ninety seven. Signed sealed published pronounced and declared by Henry Miller as his last will and testament in presence of us... Item I leave to my son Thomas Mcfarlin the remainder of my land to him his heirs and assigns forever also one negro Boy named George to him his heirs or assigns. Also one sorrel mare. Item. I leave unto my daughter Rachel one negro girl named Dinah and her increase, to her heirs or assigns. Also one sorrel hors and saddle, feather bed and furniture, two Mich cows, six sheep, one Chest, two pewter dishes and six plates, one set of knives and forks. Item I leave unto my daughter Rebecca one negro girl named Phebe and her increase, to her heirs or assigns And the remainder of my moveable Estate to be disposed of as my son Thomas may see fit, and I do hereby Constitute and appoint my two sons William and Thomas Mc farlin Executors of this my last will and testament in witness hereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this Sixteenth Day of February one thousand seven hundred and ninety two forward interlined before signed. Wills for Ann Houston's father, Christopher Houston, and brother Samuel, list Ann as an heir. Samuel's will of 1739 specifically identifies his sister as "Ann Walker", indicating that she was married by that date, a point consistent with White's DOM for this couple of 1734. Samuel's will does not give the first name of Ann's husband, only telling us that she is identified as "Ann Walker". This interpretation is consistent with the information in White 1902. It seems probable that the Ann Walker mentioned in Samuel's will is indeed the wife of John Walker III.

* Land records for Rockbridge county show several Walkers settling on Walker's Creek in Rockbridge CO, VA, prior to 1741. A land transaction 1753 shows a John Walker and wife Ann selling a parcel on Walkers Creeks adjacent to other Walkers whose property was surveyed in the early 1740's. These data are consistent with White 1902's assertion that the family moved to Rockbridge Co shortly after their initial settlement in Augusta Co. Following the marriage of John Walker and Ann Houston in 1734.

* John III was living on the Clinch River when he died sometime between 1774 and 1778. The commonly cited 1778 date is probably based on White's description above, and/or may be founded on his will which was probated in that year. It is likely, however, that he died several years previous to the court records dealing with his estate. His son Samuel is believed to have died in an Indian attack in 1776, but is mentioned in John III's will. Likewise, his grandson William (son of John IV) was taken captive by Indians in that same attack. Yet both are mentioned in John III's will, indicating that it was written prior to 1776. It seems likely that John III died prior to this attack. A DOD of c.1776 seems reasonable.

* White tells us that John Campbell=Elizabeth Walker, settled near Staunton, a few miles north of where the Walkers ultimately settled on Walkers Creek in Rockbridge Co. The area John Campbell is said to have settled is most likely part of Beverly's Grant, where settlement began about 1734. This is consistent with the Walker family moving from the Nottingham Lo about that time. A thorough search of land records etc in this area is needed to determine if there is any evidence that a John Campbell settled in this area about this time.

Samuel HOUSTON was a farmer of E. Nottingham Twp., Chester County, PA. His will, dated Sep. 19, 1739 and probated May 27, 1741 lists wife Esther, mother Martha, with his personal estate later going to Robert, Christopher and James HOUSTON, Anne WALKER, Margaret LINN, Jennett LINN, and Martha LINN, "the plantation called Phillips Bottom and Philips Hill with the improvements be returned to Christopher and James HOUSTON free of charges they paying to Robt HOUSTON and others above named £10 each."

September 19, 1739. May 27, 1741. B. 82.

To wife Esther all real and personal estate during life, she paying £3 yearly to my mother Martha Houston during life and at her decease. "and that the one half of the then personal estate be returned at his decease to Robert Houston and Christopher Houston, James Houston Ann Walker, Margaret Linn, Janet Linn, Martha Linn equally to be divided amongst them and if Christopher or James Houston decease before this becomes - _____ - that the one that survives may have the other share and if Robert Houston deceases that his oldest son have his share."

Notes for John IV Walker:

There are contradictory files for John Walker IV. Some claim him to be the John Walker of Green County, Tn. Others claim him to be the John Walker of Tuchaleechee Cove of Blount County, Tn. The John Walker of Tuchaleechee Cove was the father of John Walker Jr. who sold property in 1820 and came to McMinn County, Tn. with Rev. Robert Walker. Brothers John Walker Jr. and Samuel married sisters.

The following is transcribed from a bible once belonging to John WALKER who in 1812 was in Blount Co. TN:

From the John Walker Jr. bible records it is clear that he named his first born son as John, after his father, the second born daughter, Mary after his mother. He named the first born daughter as Elizabeth after his wife's mother, Elizabeth Colville. He named his second born son as William after his wife's father, William Davidson. He named the eleventh child after his brother, Robert Walker. He did not name a son after Samuel, probably because he never got that far down the list since he had so many daughters and so few sons.

There are three profiles of families who allege to be descended from John Walker III and Ann Houston. The line from Robert Walker, nephew of John Walker Jr. who came to McMinn County, Tn. is represented as group 8 by a paternal line descendant. The paternal lines from Samuel Walker or John Walker Jr. have never been tested.

The Green County, Tn. line supposedly from Thomas Walker, alleged son of John Walker of Green County, is represented by a descendant from William Walker and Elizabeth Culberson of Blount County, Tn. That profile is group 27. The other alleged line is a group 33 profile.

I think that the group 33 Walker line are possibly descended from a Wigton Scotland Walker female and a Vance father. The group 33 profile is a match to that of the Vance family and that much is a fact. The Scottish naming tradition suggests the Vance family is in the maternal ancestry of Samuel Walker and William Houston Walker.. And the data that was uploaded to gedmatch indicates that the Vance family was also from Wigton, Scotland as were the Walkers.

Another matching test 3T6XQ is for paternal line Campbell. If you read the history of Scotland there are 12 clans that supposedly descend from the Campbell clan. When the names were changed to Gaelic names these Scotts did not all choose the same Anglican names. And over the period of years with persecution, wars, and other atrocities many changed their names again to escape persecution. This is a descendant from the Campbell clan of Scotland.

Notes for unknown female ossibly Anderson or Long:

This portion of the files is speculation. DNA evidence indicates that John Walker IV's wife was possibly an Anderson. There is much confusion about the John Walker IV because various sources contradict each other. There seems to be a great deal of over-lap between John Walker IV of Blount County, Tn. and John Walker of Green County, Tn. Descendants from both groups match at about 6th cousin genetic distance, even as it would be if this was the same person. But Thomas Walker is documented as his son, rightly or wrongly, and the descendants from Thomas Walker are group 27 profile and not the group 8 of the Wigton, Scotland Walkers.

That the Anderson family migrated with the McMinn County, Tn. Walkers cannot be disputed. Their descendants settled near the Sanford community and are documented in a power of attorney connecting them back to Robert Anderson of Rockbridge, Va. who lived on property adjoining that of William Walker. The Anderson, Brown, Weir, and Walker families are documented in estate records and wills as intermarried.

In the name of God, Amen, I, William Walker of Rockbridge County and Commonwealth of Virginia being in my usual state of health and of sound judgment and memory do on this 4th day of February in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirteen make this my last will and testament in the manner and form following.

First, I do order and appoint that all my lawfull debts be discharged by my executors.

Secondly, I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Mary all my household furniture. Also all my live stock not already named to my children. Also my negro woman named Bett. Also the free and full priviledge of the room in the west end of my dwelling house during her natural life. Also two black children Rose and Emy to be disposed of as she shall think fit at her death.

Thirdly I give and bequeath to my two sons William & George the plantation on which I live containing three hundred and thirty two acres to be divided betwixt them equally. My son William to have my Dwelling house and that side of the plantation join Deckers tract purchased by said son Wm. My son George to have the side of said Plantation next the north river, the division line to be made paying respect to quantity and quality the same to be to them their heirs and assigns forever. Fourthly I give and bequeath to the heirs of my son John Deceased the plantation on which his widow lives in the state of Tenessee and county of Knox containing two hundred and seventy five acres to them their heirs forever. Sevently I give and bequeath to my daughter Susanna Lyle the sum of seventy five pounds like lawfull money of Virginia.

Eighthly I give and bequeath to Isaac Anderson & William Anderson, sons of Robt. Anderson the sum of seventy five pounds lawfull money to be equally divided betwixt them--

Ninthly I give and bequeath to my grandson Wm. Walker & Mary Walker orphans of Hugh Walker dec'd. the state of Tenessee the sum of one hundred & five pounds, twenty five pounds of which is now bearing interest and at the expiration of five years the whole sum will bear lawfull interest to be equally divided between them.

I Hugh Weir of the County of Rockbridge and Colony of Virginia Calling to mind that mortality of my body though sound in Memory knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die as also believing that God is able at the Resurrection to Raise this same Body and to unite it to the soul again do make and constitute this my last Will and Testamnt. That is to say first and principally I give my soul to God who gave it and my Body to be Bruied in a Christian and Decent like manner at the Direction of my Executors and as Touching such wordly Estate as it hath pleased God to Bles me with I give and Bequeath in Manner following. First I give and bequeath to my Beloved wife my old bay mare two best Cows and four sheep her bed and furniture her Chest and also all Dressing furnishing my Dwelling House with a sufficient Maintenance from my plantation during her life, as also my Negro wench during her life and then I order her to my son Abraham Jonathan likewise I order my plantation to my son Abraham and allow him to pay to my son James the sum of Two Hundred pounds good and lawful money of Viginia if Money stands at

the same value it now goes at if it alters I leave my Executors Judges in that Alteration. Likewise I give and Bequeath to my son Abraham my Sorrel Colt paying to my son George and Hugh each fifty pounds leaving the Alteration as aforesaid to the Direction of my Executors the several sums I order Abraham to pay at the expiration of two years after my Decease. Also I give to my sons John, Joseph and Samuel to each Twenty Shillings likewise I give to my Daughters Jean Cunningham, Margret Montgomery, Mary Walker, Susanna Buchanan, Elizabeth McCutchen to each Ten Shillings likewise I give and bequeath to my Grandson Hugh to wit my son Johns son the sum of Twenty pounds. Also I allow my son Abraham to provide and lay in a sufficient Quantity of food for the aforesaid Stock willed to my wife yearly. Item I give to my Grandchildren to with the Hughes to each forty Shillings and the Remainder of the thick Cloath after Abrahms suit to be equally Divided betwixt my three youngest sons and all the Remainder of my Estate to my wife to pay debts and to be at her Disposal and lastly I constitute John Weir Junior and George Weir my Executors and Revoke all former wills witnes my hand and seal this 31st Day of March in the year above Mentioned. First, there has never been any evidence of any relationship of Robert Wear (who married Rebecca Carrell and is the father of Col. Samuel Wear) and Hugh Weir of Rockbridge Co., Virginia. Many researchers have attempted to link them, but the evidence is simply not there. Robert Wear was presumably the son of Robert and Martha Wear of the Nutfield, New Hampshire Presbyterian colony (this was a remnant of a pilgramage of Presbyterians under Rev. James MacGregor during Queen Ann's War to escape religious persecution--they originally were supposed to settle in Massachussetts in 1718, but because of a severe winter and a lack of welcome from the Puritans, half of the original congregation went to Maine in 1719 and the other half went to Nutfield [renamed Londonderry]). Although there has never been proof that Robert (father of Col. Samuel Wear) was the son of the Robert and Martha Wear, it had been shown that many of the New Hampshire Presbyterians later relocated to Bucks Co., PA about 1730 and since it was known that John Wear (son of Robert and Rebecca Carrell) was born in Bucks Co., PA, many genealogists have assumed that there was a connection so it has more or less become dogma.

In contrast, Hugh Weir first appears in Lurgan twp. of Old Cumberland Co. (present-day Franklin Co.), PA on the 1751 tax list. It has been shown on an 1754 land warrant from John Weir (presumably Hugh Weir's brother) that his land was bordered on the south by Hugh Weir who had entered his land in 1746. A review of the muster roles of Captain John Hasslet's Company (whose recruits were from this area of Cumberland Co.) shows in 1758 a Hugh Weir age 28 (although this is age is almost certainly incorrect--virtually all other recruits were in ages ranging from 18-21 and would have had Hugh Sr. fathering a child at the age of ten--most likely it is a typo and his age was in fact 18); this muster role states that Hugh Weir was born in Enniskillen, Ireland. In 1759, the muster role shows a John Weir, age 18, who was born in County Antrim, Ireland. This Hugh Weir and John Weir on the muster roles of Capt. John Hasslet's Company were almost certainly the sons of Hugh Weir--although there were other

Weir's in Cumberland Co., none of them had children with the right names or ages to have appeared in this company. Assuming that these are Hugh Weir's children (and although some genealogists still argue with me, I believe that I have largely won the debate on this), then it would imply that Hugh Weir and his family were still in Ireland until at least 1741. Based on the 1754 land warrant of John Weir which shows Hugh Weir entering land in 1746, this would suggest that Hugh Weir arrived from Ireland sometime between 1741 and 1746. Based on this evidence, it would be impossible for Hugh Weir to be a brother of Robert Wear (father of Col. Samuel Wear), although it would be possible for there to be a more remote relation back in Ireland. The early records of Augusta Co., Virginia are replete with the name Weir

John Walker III's will was witnessed by three of his sons-in-law, Alexander Montgomery, William Cowan and Andrew Cowan. [30] An inventory and appraisal of Samuel Walker's estate on August 17, 1779 was also recorded in Washington Co. Will Book I. [31] It appears that John Walker IV, who administered his father and brother's estates, moved about 1786 to that part of North Carolina which later became Blount County, Tennessee, together with several known children: Samuel, John and daughter Mary (Snider). Another son, Robert, followed his father and siblings to Blount County 10-years later. (WPA, 1936) Both the aforementioned captive William Walker and his brother Robert Walker also appeared in the records of Washington County, to wit: John Walker III died in 1778, naming his grandson William in his will 31 and Robert Walker appeared on the 1787 and 1790 tax lists of Washington County. [23, 24]

On June 6, 1793 Robert Walker acquired "110 acres on the waters of the North Fork of Holstein River and on the north side of Walker's Mountain and adjoining the property of Matthias Andis." [51] On January 20, 1795, Robert Walker and his wife, Elizabeth, sold 105 acres "on the waters of the North Fork of Holston, on the north side of Walkers Mountain" for \$67 to George Buchanan. [36] These and other records permit us to accurately fix the location of Robert's property west, southwest of Abingdon in the lower part of the county. After selling his homestead Robert joined his father, John Walker IV, and brothers John and Samuel Walker, in Blount County, Tennessee. Robert may have also appeared near his father on the 1782 tax list but his first name was accidentally torn from the record. [16] Although Robert was the only Walker to appear on the 1790 tax rolls of Washington County, several other Walkers are known to have resided in the upper county in 1790. Siblings John and Margaret Walker who married siblings Susannah and John

Pitcher in 1792 are believed to have been Robert and Elizabeth's children, and John Walker IV's grandchildren. [27A, 27B]

Notes for Unknown female possibly Davidson or Vance:

These files are speculative files based on the premis that Robert Walker was married to Elizabeth Long. These are internet files and deeds that show the relationship of the McMinn County, Rockbridge, Va., and Blount County, Tn. Long family:

William Long purchased this property, probably at Knoxville, Tn. and probably for his Jones cousins since they are the one who assigned the property to another person. Since it is only a few miles from Blount County, Tn. to the location where the property sales were made in Knoxville, it is very likely this is the same William Long who was living in Blount County, Tn. in 1813. Making this even more likely is the fact that the property was purchased close to the other group of relatives who were living in Blount County, Tn. prior to the land grant sales.

Hiwassee Land Grant Book C located in McMinn County, Tn. Court house in the register of deeds office:

Page 12 land grant number 1535.

William Long this day enters as general agreeably to law, the South West quarter of section 27th of Fractional Township, 4th Range 2. West of the Meridian, in the County of McMinn, Hiwassee District, beginning on the South West corner of said quarter. 25th, Oct. 1825. 160 acres. Wm Long

I do certify the above to be a true copy of the records of my office. 25th Oct. 1825. Grant No. 951. Issued 21st. May 1828. Nat Smith Entry Taker.

I do assign all my right and title, claim and intrust unto Simeon Oswalt to the within certificate for value received the 9th August. 1828.

William Long is in a Rockbridge, Va. deed book which states that he was living in Blount County, Tn. with Mary, his wife. So this is documentation which connects BOTH the Rockbridge, Va. Walker family and the Blount County, Tn. Walker family. And then they are connected again in McMinn County, Tn. by the land grant purchase located 1/4 mile west of Rev. Robert Walker.

1/2 Acre lot William Long and Mary his wife (late Mary Brown); John Wilkinson and Margaret his wife, (late Margaret Brown), of Blunt County, Tennessee; George Brown and William Bronw, heirs and heirsess of William Brown, dec'd to David Hutcheson of Lexington, VA. 1/2 Acre, lot # __; sold to John Galbraith who dieid intestate without making conveyance; Galbraith sold to John Mares, after John Mares decease Chancery suit to settle title; William Alexander agreeable to the will of testator sold to John Newcommer, who relinquished his claim to David Hutcheson. Bounded by lots of said John Newcomer and Robert Gold, James Maackey and by Washington St; and is same lot whereon Newcommer erected a brick Dwelling house and other buildings.

Rockbridge County, VA Deed Book H, p. 335. 26 March 1813

\$525.00 Lot # 16 in Lexington John Wilkinson and Margaret his wife; William Long and Mary his wife, all of Blount County, Tennessee to John Irvine of Rockbridge. William Brown, formerly of Lexington, died seized and possessed of Lot #16 in Lexington, situated on corner of Washington and Main sts; being 128 1/3 ft on Washington, 97 1/2 ft on Main st; originally laid off and claimed by Andrew Reid. Two undivided fourths of said lot which they conveyed to John Jordan and he to John Irvine. Other 2/4 vested to William Brown, Jr. and George Brown. Both George Brown and William Brown, Jr. presumed dead, so entire lot conveyed.

Generation 4 (con't)

Here is another connection. The Brown family supplied the property upon which Walnut Grove Methodist Church and cemetery was built. I have the Brown deeds from McMinn County, Tn. register of deeds office. It was Mary C. Brown from that family who married "Dock" Brock, the son of my great-great-grandfather Terry Wayne Brock. I don't remember if Dock Brock was the son of Terry Wayne Brock and first wife Elizabeth McDowell or of Terry Wayne Brock and second wife Elizabeth "Betsie" Walker.

My great-great-grandfather Simeon Simpson Smith bought part of the Brown estate in McMinn County, Tn.

It was 1825 when William Long made the land grant purchase.

Notes for Rev. Robert Walker:

Per a letter found in records of E. G. Fisher Library:

In a book of Tzx lists of Roane County, Tn. one Robert Walker paid for a privilege license of some type about 1817.

The Samuel S. Walker estate record in Roane County, Tn. has Burk Priddy, the son-in-in-law of Rev. Robert Walker listed as owing money for a loan made to him by Samuel S. Walker.

- ii. JOHN WALKER was born between 1780-1790 in probably Blount County, Tn.. He died in probably McMinn County, Tn..
- iii. WILLIAM HOUSTON WALKER was born on 22 Jun 1788 in probably Blount County, Tn.. He died on 03 Oct 1858 in Bradley County, Tn.. He married Mary "Polly" Beck, daughter of Jakob (Jacob) Beck Sr. and Mary Winkler on 13 Oct 1807. She was born on 14 Jul 1789.

Notes for William Houston Walker:

In the 1850 census of McMinn County, Tn. there was an Arthur Houston age 54 with wife Jane age 52 and children Joh M., Robert, Jane N., Lavinia, and Sarah. It appears this could be descendants from the Houston maternal line.

There also was a George B. Houston age 41 with Leanda age 41 and children William, Harriettt, Joseph, Robert, Martha, Elizabweth, and Jane. George would appear to be the brother of Arthur Houston.

5. **JOHN JR⁴ WALKER** (John IV³, John III², John II¹) was born on 09 May 1771 in Russell County, Va.--now Scott County, Va.. He died in Probably Benton County, Arkansas. He married Catherine Davidson, daughter of William Davidson and Elizabeth Colville on 20 May 1794. She was born on 08 Feb 1772 in Virginia.

Notes for John Jr Walker:

John Walker Jr. first obtained property in Blount County, Tn. from John Walker Sr. on April 22, 1798 registered on page 203 of Deed Book B.

In March of 1820 he sold that property to his brother Samuel Walker. Then in Knoxville, Tn. on Nov. 1820 he purchased Hiwassee Land Grant property with Rev. Robert Walker, Andrew Cowan, and Lewis Ball. John's purchased an adjoining track north of Rev. Robert Walker's property.

He remained in McMinn County, Tn. for some time and then migrated to other states. He eventually ended up in Benton County, Arkansas as did his daughter Ann who married John Roper Wooten in McMinn County, Tn. in 1838. The list of his children's names came from a transcribed posting of his family bible. From that family bible it can be seen that his first born daughter was named Mary which indicates that Mary was his mother's name.

- ix. ANN WALKER was born on 18 Aug 1812. She died about 1896 in Benton County, Arkansas. She married John Roper Wooten on 30 Oct 1838 in McMinn County, Tn.. He was born about 1812 in Jefferson County, Tn.. He died about 1892 in Benton County, Arkansas.
- x. JEAN WALKER was born on 30 Nov 1814.
- xi. ROBERT WALKER was born on 10 Sep 1816.
